President's Corner

I'm posing a reflective activity. Read the next paragraph and maybe keep notes as you go.

Think about a problem in our work, our field, or in your state. Now, think about why you believe it's a problem. Next, think about the students and clients this problem impacts. What are the negative effects? Finally, what are we doing to find a solution?

This is an informal, regular activity for all of us. We may hear about something happening to those we serve that seems atrocious, or recognize gaps in our knowledge and skills, or in others. As you can tell, this is step one above. This is us thinking about a problem.

We move to the next step if we are reflective. We ask ourselves, "Why don't I have that knowledge?" or "Why isn't that person receiving services?" We may phone a friend or chat in a hallway about this issue and why it exists. Then, if the conversation is engaging enough, we may move into the next phase. Questions turn more towards frustration as we think about the detriment to students or clients. Serious venting can happen in this phase because we all care deeply about our work and thinking about negative outcomes is upsetting.

However, the final step is the most important and often where we throw up our hands. When we ask ourselves how to make positive change, and we don't have a solution, we may come full stop. I guarantee the caring hasn't stopped, and the passion hasn't stopped. Often, it's simply because we don't know what to do next and with what resources.

For my monthly recommendation, I suggest you do the exercise above and when you get to the final step...you make a move. Reach out to someone who can appreciate your frustration and cares about our work and comes up with a plan. If your plan only positively changes the life of one person, then you have success. When that happens, find a way to share your story, because your success will lead to another.

What's New AER?

The AER Strategic Plan calls for effective and efficient operations; and this move positions AER to better serve you and even closer to reaching each of our strategic goals.

TSBVI Online Learning Opportunities!

A FREE Nemeth online resource is now available for Pre-K through 8th-grade levels on the TSBVI Online Learning webpage! It is designed to provide easy access to support learning or reinforcing Nemeth braille code skills for families, teachers or paraeducators working with students who are braille readers.

These modules are a companion to the TSBVI publication, Nemeth at a Glance. Dr. Derrick Smith, professor at the University of Alabama in Huntsville, was the creator of this series, with sections by Janet Bean, Lead Teacher in the TSBVI Curriculum Department.

Although presented in the grade level order that symbols are typically introduced to students in school, you can dip in at any level to find specific symbols and examples.

Modules include an explanation of the symbol, relevant rules, and examples of how to use the symbol in math examples. There are multiple samples of using Nemeth within UEB contexts. Short, ungraded quizzes following each module will help document mastery of the material and provide useful feedback. Completing these optional quizzes will lead to a certification of completion.

Modules for PreK–1st grade, 2nd–3rd grade, 4th–6th grade, and 7/8 grade are already available at https://www.tsbvi.edu/courses/course-listing#nemethdescription. Upper-level math grades will be posted in the fall of 2019.

Digital Talking Book

In keeping with the theme of last month's Vision Serve Alliance CEO Summit of making a bigger impact, I'm pleased to tell you that we've recently converted our audio book technology to Digital Talking Book format. We aim to serve many more people now that our audio books are compatible with the talking book machines provided by the National Library Service. Honoring Those We Have Lost

One of the most significant traditions that AER inherited from our predecessor associations was the inspirational and reverent reading of a Necrology List, which was presented at each conference of AAWB—the American Association of Workers for the Blind. For decades, AAWB respectfully read a list of members and colleagues who had died since their previous gathering. AER has continued that tradition and will again present the 2018–2020 Memorial List in the opening session of our 2020 international conference.

Constructing and maintaining these memorial lists is one of the roles of AER's History and Memorial Committee. It is a somber task, but one that inspires us with each remarkable life we learn about and document.

As in the past, AER's History and Memorial Committee depends on your assistance in identifying those in our "professional family" who have died during the 2018–2020 biennium. We maintain a database of their names and information about each individual and use that to construct the Memorial List that will be at the AER International Conference in St. Louis next July. We also maintain an archive of these biennial listings, which will be included in the AER Archives soon to be housed at the American Printing House for the Blind.

We invite you—indeed, we encourage you—to submit the names of our colleagues who have died since January 2018. If you know of colleagues who passed away during this timeframe, please submit their names using the following link: bit.ly/2018-2020Memorial

The submission form will ask you for the following information:

Your email address;

Deceased colleague's name;

The colleague's state or province of residence;

A brief statement of her or his role in the education or rehabilitation of people who are blind or visually impaired;

An obituary or a link to an obituary or tribute, if available.

With your help, we will honor our colleagues who have left us. We truly hope that we have few losses in this biennium and that the list we present at the 2020 conference will be a short one.
