Barrels of Laughs, and Bricks, and Memories

So, those of you who know me really well know that I love a good laugh and love nothing more than making others smile and laugh. Yep, I can be pretty serious and can take myself too seriously plenty of the time, but then again, I think this is an affliction that any number of us suffer from now and then. In any case, I don't know about you, but I could sure use a really good laugh right about now. Not just something slapstick but something that might be metaphorical of what we're all feeling these days. Years ago, when I wasn't merely the AER interim guy but held the staff reins with fixity, I put together an article for what once-upon-a-time was the predecessor to the Voice, the AER Report, that got lots of favorable and fun feedback. I've written many things over the course of time, columns like last month's AER Voice article that were, frankly, kind of weighty and maybe not "fun". Even to this day, some people remind me of how much they loved that piece. Since it seems to me that all of us could really benefit from a meaningful and amusing metaphor for life, let me do a reprise below of the classic comedic anecdote (now available all over the place on the Internet) that I shared with the AER membership all those years ago:

Accident Report

This one needs an introduction, so you won't be lost at the beginning. This man was in an accident at work, so he filled out an insurance claim. The insurance company contacted him and asked for more information. This was his response:

"I am writing in response to your request for additional information, for block number 3 of the accident reporting form. I put 'poor planning' as the cause of my accident. You said in your letter that I should explain more fully and I trust the following detail will be sufficient. I am an amateur radio operator and on the day of the accident, I was working alone on the top section of my new 80-foot tower. When I had completed my work, I discovered that I had, over the course of several trips up the tower, brought up about 300 pounds of tools and spare hardware. Rather than carry the now unneeded tools and material down by hand, I decided to lower the items

down in a small barrel by using the pulley attached to the gin pole at the top of the tower. Securing the rope at ground level, I went to the top of the tower and loaded the tools and material into the barrel. Then I went back to the ground and untied the rope, holding it tightly to ensure a slow decent of the 300 pounds of tools."

"You will note in block number 11 of the accident reporting form that I weigh only 155 pounds. Due to my surprise of being jerked off the ground so suddenly, I lost my presence of mind and forgot to let go of the rope. Needless to say, I proceeded at a rather rapid rate of speed up the side of the tower. In the vicinity of the 40-foot level, I met the barrel coming down. This explains my fractured skull and broken collarbone. Slowed only slightly, I continued my rapid ascent, not stopping until the fingers of my right hand were two knuckles deep into the pulley. Fortunately, by this time, I had regained my presence of mind and was able to hold onto the rope in spite of my pain. At approximately the same time, however, the barrel of tools hit the ground and the bottom fell out of the barrel."

"Devoid of the weight of the tools, the barrel now weighed approximately 20 pounds. I refer you again to my weight in block number 11. As you might imagine, I began a rapid descent down the side of the tower. In the vicinity of the 40-foot level, I met the barrel coming up. This accounts for the two fractured ankles, and the lacerations of my legs and lower body. The encounter with the barrel slowed me enough to lessen my injuries when I fell onto the pile of tools and, fortunately, only three vertebrae were cracked. I am sorry to report, however, that as I lay there on the tools, in pain, unable to stand and watching the empty barrel 80 feet above me, I again lost my presence of mind. I let go of the rope..."

Help With Research Study

My name is Audra Bishop and I am an AER student member and a graduate student at the University of North Texas. For my dissertation, I am collecting information about Early Intervention (EI) services for children who are blind or visually impaired (BVI) and their families across the United States. I am inviting Certified Teachers of Students with Visual Impairments (CTVI), Certified Orientation and Mobility Specialists (COMS), or a dual-certified (CTVI and COMS) professionals in the United States to complete the following survey.

The survey will require approximately 15-25 minutes to complete. The information gathered should help provide current information about EI services for children with BVI and their families. The study will help identify current practices that may impact children with BVI and their families by consolidating useful information about the EI referral process, service delivery, and service frequency for children with BVI across the United States. Only aggregate data results will be presented. No individual responses will be reported.

What's Cookin' AER

Tomato-Watermelon Salad with Turmeric Oil

Red, juicy and sweet - tomatoes and watermelon are soul maters and they both need salt, spice and fat to reach their full potential! Make sure your tomatoes and watermelon are room temperature -- if they are too cold, they'll make the spiced coconut oil seize.

INGREDIENTS

¼ cup virgin coconut oil

1 tsp. coarsely crushed peppercorns

1 tsp. coarsely crushed coriander seeds

½ tsp. cumin seeds

½ tsp. ground turmeric

¼ large seedless watermelon (about 3 lb.), preferably yellow, rind removed, flesh cut into ½" pieces (about 4 cups)

2 medium heirloom tomatoes, cut into %" pieces 8 oz. mild French feta, cut into %" pieces Flaky sea salt

RECIPE PREPARATION

Heat coconut oil, peppercorns, coriander seeds, cumin seeds, and turmeric in a small saucepan over medium until fragrant, about 3 minutes. Let turmeric oil cool slightly.

Arrange watermelon, tomato, and feta on a platter. Drizzle turmeric oil evenly over and sprinkle with salt
