Idaho News

Hello from Idaho! My name is Tina Johnson, and this is my second year as the NRAER Idaho State Representative. I am a TVI and working towards O&M certification. I work for Idaho Educational Services for the Deaf and the Blind as an outreach consulting teacher in the northern region of Idaho. Let me tell you about a few exciting activities that are happening in Idaho:

Who's Who in Idaho!

Alison Stevens facilitates monthly meetings for a community of practice in Idaho. Members include TVIs, COMS, and the regional BVI director from IESDB, staffing from the Idaho Commission for the Blind and Visually impaired (ICBVI), AT specialist, and TVIs from school districts. In past meetings, Alison has invited speakers from the Helen Keller Center and encourages the community to share and collaborate with each other in the interest of our students, especially for transitionary students. This month the community explored *I'm Determined* as presented by John McNaught who was a keynote speaker at 2021 Idaho Transition Institute. The focus was on *The Good Day Plan* which can help students to map out what a good day would look like and use this map as a guide to get back to having a good day in case their day takes a turn otherwise. Having a good day helps students to become self-determined, accountable, and feel connected. See embedded video posted below.

Idaho Winter Camp

IESDB and Gooding Elks Lodge are hosting a four-day Winter Camp near Sun Valley in February. This camp is offered, free of charge, for 12–18-year-old students with visual impairments. Campers will enjoy outdoor activities such as tandem snowmobile rides, cross country skiing, snow shoeing, and tubing by day and then warm up next to a wood fire and friendly conversation by night. There is even a dance party planned for the last evening of camp! Little do the campers know, but components of Expanded Core Curriculum are embedded in camp activities (snicker).

Work Readiness Summer Camp

IESDB and ICBVI are partnering to provide a Work Readiness Summer Camp at Boise State University to be held in June. This four-day camp provides students ages 14-15 with a variety of opportunities that gear them up for the world of employment, understanding the benefits of teamwork, and

engaging them with fellow students to learn independent living skills. Students need to be clients of ICBVI and will be housed in BSU dorms. This camp is also free of charge for the campers.

Hello from Montana and the Montana School for the Deaf and the Blind! Professionals across our state continue to meet the challenges of not only great distances to travel but the ongoing pandemic. Montana School for Deaf and Blind has a fully staffed and highly qualified Department (on campus and outreach) serving students and children from birth and beyond. Most recently, our Life Skills, Employment, Academics and Post-High School Program (LEAP) is up and running. This program supports students post-secondary who are working towards goals for independent living, job exploration and post-secondary education. This program works in conjunction with Montana Vocational Rehabilitation Blind and Low Vision division. Blind and Low Vision division of Montana continues to serve individuals in Montana in their Pre-ETS program as well as adults with visual impairments.

Wyoming News - What's happening in Wyoming?

CVI Bookstudy

We are through the first half of the school year and Wyoming Vision Outreach Services has some exciting happenings across the state. During the COVID shutdowns in the Spring of 2020, we were prompted to virtually support our TVIs and COMS across the state as they suddenly were catapulted to rethinking how to provide services to their students in a virtual environment. This began a statewide quarterly TVI/COMS Zoom forum.

From the forum and listening to the needs of the group, this year, has brought an enriching online book study of the book Vision and the Brain, Understanding Cerebral Visual Impairment in Children by Amanda Hall Lueck & Gordon N. Dutton, editors. This group meets bi-monthly to discuss the reading

and share each individual's application of the new skills and knowledge. The response has been positive and participants have been actively engaged in rich discussion.

Transition Services for Students ages 14-21

This year, Wyoming students are benefiting from an Interagency endeavor between Wyoming Vision Outreach Services and Department of Vocational Rehabilitation. Through grant funding provided by DVR, VOS was able to hire an independent contractor to work with us in engaging all 48 school districts in the state to take a deeper look at the transition services being provided to our students who are blind or visually impaired, including students who are college and career bound and those who have more complex needs.

This is an effort to better support and ensure that the 9 components of the Expanded Core Curriculum (ECC) for Blind and visually impaired (B/VI) are being incorporated into student IEPs and that students are obtaining the important post secondary skills that they will need for future success once they leave the public school setting. As part of this great work, monthly web trainings for the second half of this school year are in the works, as well as an on-site two day training in June that will have two, one day tracts. One that is geared at supporting staff and teams working with students with complex needs that include B/VI and one for staff and teams working with career and college track students. Adult Services

In an effort to find ways to improve our services to adult clients, we are continuing to have rich discussions covering a variety of informative topics during our monthly teleconference adult forums. Additionally, we have also created mini vision kits that we are using as a promotional item to build referral connections with other community agencies. The kits include some basic items such as bump dots, signature guide, bold line pens, to then leave with senior centers, local librarians and other community agencies that tend to serve our adult clients and could be a referral point. Through this, it is our hope to establish long-term partnerships that enable other agencies to provide some very basic support and build a connection to then point individuals with vision needs to the more in-depth services provided through VOS.


Interested in becoming a part of the NRAER board?
